Leaders who served under various presidential administrations reflected on how drug issues have changed over the past 20 years and offered recommendations for addressing some of today's most press-

ing drug problems – from marijuana and tobacco to prescription drug abuse. William Bennett, who was the first ONDCP direc-tor under President George H.W. Bush, said the mari-juana used by kids and

juana used by kids and teens in previous decades was much less potent than it is today.

"The science is overwhelming, We're talking about high THC levels—15-20 percent, sometimes 25-30 percent, We've got to be crazy to throw this stuff into circulation," he exclaimed.

stuff into circulation," he exclaimed.
Brown, who served under President Bill Clinton, offered what he believes is the solution to today's teen drug use problem.

"There is an answer (to the drug abuse problem) and the answer is communities working together at the local level...and that is what this organization

the local level...and that is what this organization [CADCA] has been doing for 25 years," he said.
"I am a strong believer that if we mobilize our local resources, we can make a difference."
