Regulations that apply to A-frame signs are defined in the town Zoning Ordinance with sign regulations. Some of the general rules are as follows:

"Only businesses that are physically located within Town commercial or industrial zoning districts or churches in residential zoning districts may display A-frame signs.

"Signs are not to be placed within any paved portion of a street, sidewalk or median. They must be one foot behind the curb

or pavement if no curb is present.

*Signs are not to be placed where they pose a hazard.

*Signs are to be no more than 24 inches wide and 36 inches tall.

Seth Leibsohn, the group's chair, stated: "Marijuana is a mind-altering, dangerous substance that harms the brain, especially the teen brain, and causes aboth child development and adult behavior.

"Legalizing this drug would clearly harm our youth and society, standing as an obstacle to their success in school and in life and the future of Arizona and our country."

The group plans to raise funds to raise awareness about marijuana's harms and to oppose any ballot initiatives to legalize the drug.

drug. Sally Schindel, the group's treasurer, knows firsthand the effects of

firsthand the effects of marijuana. She lost her son when he took his own life, leaving a note stating, "Marijuana killed my soul + ruined my brain."

"Tam committed to helping Andy help others," said Schindel.

"Together, Andy and I will do everything we can to save the lives of others by vigorously fighting the greed and irresponsibility of the legalization movement."

Yavapai County Attorney Sheila Polk is also a member of the group.

A longstanding opponent of legalization, Polk is a statewide expert on the harms that marijuana inflicts on youth.

Marijuana the developing adolescent brain and its use sets youth up for a lifetime of battling addiction," she said.

"Kids who regularly use pot are three times less likely to graduate from high school.

"The single most effective measure to protect our kids from marijuana's destruction is to keep it illegal."

Merilee Fowler, executive director of MAT-FORCE, an award-winning substance abuse coalition, said, "I joined Arizonans for Responsible Drug Policy because I passionately care about our state's children and their futures.

"Some 32,000 of our high school students indicate they would likely try marijuana if it becomes legal. We have to stop this legalization train before we harm an entire generation of our youth."


