'Tis the season!

The spring time brings about many events, such as prom and graduation. Unfortunately, these special times for our kids can turn very dangerous, very quickly. Every year we hear stories of children who are hurt or worse, killed, during this time of celebration.

The Fountain Hills Coalition asks that you please talk with your teens about the dangers of drugs and alcohol before their big nights. Here's a seven-item checklist to help with a safe prom and graduation

1. Be sure you know your child's complete itinerary for the evening, including who they will be with and phone numbers where they can be

contacted. 2. If your child is going to a party at someone's home, contact the parents to be sure that they will not be allowing illegal drugs or underage drinking in their home. If you are a member of

the Safe Homes Network, we encourage you to utilize the Safe Homes directory to call and confirm the above. 3. Determine a fair curfew that is based on your child's

previous history of responsibility. 4. Take stock of all the alcohol and prescription drugs

5. Know who is driving and ensure the driver will remain sober for the entire evening.

6. Establish a couple of mandatory call-in times; these will help know where your kids are.

7. Give your child the unconditional option of calling you at any time for help or advice which includes picking them up if needed. Create a code word that your child can use to indicate that they need your assistance.

Robotics Team takes fifth in regional

Eight Fountain Hills High School students in the Botball Robotics Club competed in the San Diego Regional Botball Tournament in late March, taking fifth place overall.

Those students attending were Christian McErlean, Riely Brande, Andrew Cooper, Wyatt Carlowe, Elizabeth Mora, Dalton Nixon, Kahri Smith and Aurora beans.

According to club advisor Dr. Paul McElligott, Botball is the most difficult of the several types of robotics available.

"It is 100 percent programming that requires a robot turn on by light activation, score maximum points against an competitor and shutting off before

120 seconds," he explained. "It is a highly regarded competition.

Local students had a slow start as several problems cropped up from trans-

porting the robot. After a few adjustments, however, McElligott said that the robot performed well. In fact, the robot had the high scoring round of the day of 300 points.

The judges were impressed that the team won two separate awards, including the Judges Choice Award for best design of a grabbing mechanism and a finalist award. They came in fifth place out of 35 teams.

We are very proud of their accomplishments,' McElligott said.

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
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
